**YES/AND** "I have measured out my life with coffee spoons." *T.S. Eliot* 

The hesitant speaker in Elliot's poem measured out his life in the most banal all of the entities - the coffee spoon resting on the counter after the coffee has been stirred and drunk.

The spoon still has a few drops in the bowl, and it sets there waiting.

We have been in our cocooned worlds for a long time now. We, too, have been

waiting...waiting.

Waiting for assurances that it was safe to come out. Waiting for the relief of vaccination.

Waiting to see each other's faces again.

Waiting to smile and hug.

Waiting can paralyze. Even the tiniest step forward seems insurmountable. Fear can grab us, and we quickly scurry back to the "safety" of our cocoon.

But waiting is also the time for metamorphosis. A time to re-gather our strength, to re-define our battles, to reconfigure ourselves. Perhaps we learned to do with fewer material things; maybe we recognized that some of the "faces" we wore were not really projections of our true self. Maybe, just sitting and waiting taught us more than we know: "Be still, and know that I am God!" *Psalm 46:10* 

Through the magic of Zoom, I spent many evenings in discussions of Sacred Ground, an Episcopal workshop on the systemic racism that has enveloped our country for centuries. And our own Adult Study group spent a month reading and discussing Caste, another troubling look at how caste privileges have tribalized our society.

The absence of the usual noisy drumbeats of life, the quietness of the cocoon, allowed a lot of musing, a lot of pondering, a lot of soul-searching. It provided time to incubate a new, "more perfect creature."

"You think I am impoverishing myself by withdrawing from [society], but in my solitude I have woven for myself a silken web or chrysalis, and nymph-like, shall ere long burst forth a more perfect creature."

Henry David Thoreau

So now that we on the cusp of returning to the world, how can we, an older congregation, mobilize our pandemic strengths to affect some change in our troubled society?

Midway through the poem, Eliot's Prufrock asks that same question: "Do I dare disturb the universe?" Our answer to that must be "Yes!"

Our first, and primary, resource is our continued prayer. Our second, and not so easy, resource is the "good trouble" that Rep. John Lewis advocated. And, that is the same message that Jesus used to commission his disciples: "Love one another as I have loved you...Lay down your life for each other." *John 15:12-13.* 

A chrysalis molts into a butterfly. It dies so it can be reborn. Unlike the inert cocoon, a butterfly joins the world as a crucial pollinator.

Perhaps that is our path- to be the "pollinators" in family and friend conversations, to speak cogently of Christ's message of love **for all**, to "seed" everyone so the fruit of real equality will finally bloom in our world. We need to venture into our corner of the world "to do the work you have given us to do, to love and serve you as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord."

**YES.** we are almost "back to normal."

**AND**, we must reconfigure that to a new normal. We must be the proverbial butterfly whose gentle stirring of the air - society - creates new currents of life.

Molting from our cocoon frees us. Prayer assures our mission:

If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. John 15:7
